honors Ireland's patron saint, one much more deserving of the role. Saint Patrick's Cabbage is a saxifrage that bears the saints name both in its common name and its binomial moniker, Saxifraga spathularis. It is a distinctly Irish plant, being found only on the Island of Ireland as well as northwestern Spain and the mountains of north Portugal where it is commonly called abelairiña. Its clusters of green leaves bear stalked pannicles of pretty white flowers that show numerous pink dots on the petals. S. spathularis has a wide tolerance to soil conditions and can be found in a variety of habitats, from exposed mountains to the shade of humid woodlands. In Ireland, it is distributed along the west coast, from Cork to Donegal, however its main base is in Kerry and West Cork..

### The Lemons In My Garden

The flavor of and aroma lemons is delightful to me and I have a number of "lemony" plants. I have had a Meyer Lemon (*Citrus × meyeri*) for several years. However, I think I have a "lemon of a lemon," for it has never produced any viable fruit, despite its fragrant blooms. Lemon juice has been cosmetically used as mild hair bleach. Its oils are used to scent food, perfume and cosmetics and it makes a refreshing summer drink. It's a great source of vitamin C, potassium and folate. I decided that if I could not grow a producing lemon tree, I would enjoy the aroma and flavor of lemons through other plants.

I planted a small clump of Lemon Grass (*Cymbopogon citratus*) when I moved here two years ago. The Lemon Grass seems quite happy. It has grown into a clump which is at least six feet tall and six feet wide. The plump bases of the shoots of lemon grass are used in Thai cooking. The leaves can be used to make a flavorful tea. A spray of the essential oils is said to have antibacterial properties and I am told it repels mosquitos.

The Lemon Verbena (*Aloysia triphyela*) planted in my "herb circle" struggles along in a most valiant manner. Maybe it will bloom next summer with the addition of compost and some fertilizer. Its leaves are extremely flavorful and can be used in drinks, fruits, sweet dishes and herbal teas. The tea is mildly sedative and soothes bronchial and nasal congestion, nausea and indigestion.

Lemon Basil (*Ocimum basilicum citriodorum*) is a real soldier. It has somehow spread far and wide in my small yard. Last year it came through our mild winter. This year it appears to be unhappy about the colder weather, but I know it will return come spring, as it readily self sows. It can be used to flavor foods and would be a good addition to herbal oils and vinegars.

The last of my "lemon plants" is Lemon Balm (*Melissa Officialis*). This was planted in a mostly shady spot and looks very happy and luxuriant. It shelters and spreads under and around other plants in its vicinity. Some varieties grow into bush form while others stay lower to the ground. Fresh leaves can be used to impart a lemon flavor to cooked dishes, oil, vinegar and liqueur. The leaves may sooth insect bites and can be brewed into a tea. Extract of Lemon Balm is said to be anti-viral.

While prowling the plant nurseries this spring, I'll be keeping my eyes open for lemon mint, lemon geranium, lemon thyme and any other lemony plant available.

It takes specialized training to learn about the various uses of plants and how to identify them. The plants above are all recognized as culinary herbs and purchased from certified growers. I have no doubt they are as they were labeled. Herbs have been used for dyes, medicines, cosmetics and flavorings. It might be the leaves, the roots, bark, seeds, stems or flowers which are used in particular ways, and the active ingredient could be extracted from the plant in a wide variety of ways. Some herbs are gathered only seasonally. Caution is advised if foraging, as there are herbs which look very similar to plants which are toxic. If using an herb for the first time, use in small amounts to determine any allergic reaction.

# Have You Tried It Yet?

Betty Rogers, our Volunteer Hours expert, presented a program on the new on-line reporting system at our last meeting. The system is now up and running and ready for our certified members to use. Student Interns must still report directly to Betty each month.

If you have not tried the new system yet, you need to dip your toes in the water (more exactly, your fingers to the keyboard) and begin this new adventure! It is now the only way to report your volunteer and continuing education hours. If you do not have a computer, get to a computer of a friend, family member, public library, or Extension office. So let's get started and get you officially set up in the system!

### Getting Set Up The First Time

In the URL line near the top of your screen, type <u>https://texas.mastergardenersystem.org</u> and press ENTER. The page that appears gives you a place to supply your e-mail address and then to click on the **New User** button at the bottom of the page. The system will send a temporary password to your email address. After you exit and go to your e-mail to get the temporary password, start the procedure again from the beginning. Log-in using your e-mail, the password, then press **LOGIN**. This will officially take you into the system. A brown banner near the top of the page will greet you by name!

In the gold block on the right side labeled "YOUR INFORMATION," click on <u>Edit Your Profile</u>. Fill in the information requested such as name, address, phones, etc. Notice that the phone section gives you the choice of which number you prefer callers to use. All of this information will automatically be transferred into the Member Roster. You can change any of this information in the future by returning to <u>Edit Your Profile</u>.

Below the phone section is the place to make up a password of your choosing. DON'T FORGET TO WRITE A REMINDER!

You can even insert your picture if you know how to do this. If not, ask for help. It is not required, but wouldn't it be nice if everyone did this. You could go to the Member Roster, click on a name, and see the face of Master Gardeners you don't know. So far, Leland Johnson and I are the only ones who have entered our photo. His looks like a studio portrait. Mine is one I cropped from a snapshot I had on my computer.

# After you complete the blanks on this page, scroll to the bottom and click on SAVE INFORMATION.

You are now officially in the system and can start entering your volunteer hours. For future visits to the Texas Master Gardener Volunteer System, you will just type in the URL, type in your password and press LOGIN. To make it even easier, BOOKMARK the homepage the first time you login.

### Continue to the next page to learn how to enter your volunteer hours.

### **Entering Volunteer Hours**

Start your session by entering the URS <u>https://texas.mastergardenersystem.org</u> and ENTER. At the Home Page, type your own password and press LOGIN.

In the gold block on the right side labeled "YOUR INFORMATION," click on <u>Add New Hours</u>. You will see six places to enter information. Use only the ones you need for each entry. If you are not at an education event, then do not enter *Continuing Education* hours. Only use *Miles Driven* if you would like to use this to accumulate driving miles to report on your Income Tax if you itemize volunteer work. Master Gardeners report driving time as *Volunteer Hours* and it is done as a separate <u>Event Description</u>.

Event Description	Type the meeting, program, or project you attended so that you remember the event.
Event Date	Use the drop down calendar at the end of the event. Click on the date which
Apply to Project (REQUIRED)	will appear in the Event Date blank.
Miles Driven	Use the down arrow to drop down a list of events. Click on one to Apply to Project.
Volunteer Hours	Use the Miles Driven only if you want the record for IRS tax forms next year.
Continuing Education	Enter Volunteer Hours in correct decimal form (.5 for ½ hour, .75 for ¾ hour, etc)

# **IMPORTANT**: Now scroll to the bottom of the page and click on SAVE HOURS. Failure to do this step means all your above information will not be recorded.

FOR EXAMPLE, to record hours for attending an MG Meeting and staying for the program and then doing the travel time as a separate item as Betty requested, do the following steps.

Starting with <u>Add New Hours</u>, make the **Event Description** about attending a meeting. EXAMPLE: Attended regular MG Meeting. Enter the **Event Date** using the drop down calendar. Use the drop down arrow and click to **Apply A Project**. In the **Volunteer Hours** blank, enter the length of time for the meeting, then scroll down and **SAVE HOURS**.

Now do the above process again starting with <u>Add New Hours</u> and make the **Event Description** about your Continuing Education time. *EXAMPLE: Attended MG Meeting program on the new Volunteer Hours System.* Enter the **Event Date** using the drop down calendar. Use the drop down arrow and click to **Apply A Project.** In the **Continuing Education** blank, enter the length of time for the program, and then scroll down and **SAVE HOURS**.

Now do the above process again starting with <u>Add New Hours</u> and make the **Event Description** about your travel time. *EXAMPLE: Travel time to MG Meeting.* Enter the **Event Date** using the drop down calendar. Use the drop down arrow and click to **Apply A Project**. In the **Volunteer Hours** blank, enter you travel time, and then scroll down and **SAVE HOURS**.

When finished with reporting hours for the meeting, the continuing education program, and the travel time, go to the gold block and click on <u>View Your Hours</u>. Here you will see the final result of your work which tallies your volunteer, CE, and travel time.

To end your session, click on LOG OUT at the top of the page above the gold Texas Master Gardener banner.

As you do this month by month, the hours will accumulate. From this, Extension office reports can be made, awards for service can be issued, and credit for certification will be applied.

You can also go to the gold block for "GENERAL INFORMATION" and click on the <u>Member Roster</u> to see your name, address, phone, and e-mail there for MG's to use in contacting you. I hope you added a photo !
